Bold House Receives Renovations

As the 1988-'89 academic year comes to an end, things are beginning to look up at the bold Psi house. The ongoing renovation project currently being supervised continues. In the meantime, the bold brothers of the house have contributed significantly to the completion of minor renovations.

Many parts of the house have been neglected over the years; as a result, things become broken and unusable. In recent efforts to upgrade some features of the house, the brothers have pitched in to begin some restoration. First, the men's and women's restrooms in the tap room have been completely restored. They are now fully functional. Also, the great hall has been repainted. This new ambiance is more appropriate for our new furniture: four new, sturdy couches, five matching chairs, and a coffee table. Finally, the new brothers of the house (initiated in May) have finished painting the back stairwell and stairs by the side entrance. The brothers have all come to realize a new responsibility to the house; this will continue in the years to come.

The major house renovations are being supervised by Stetson-Harza, an overseeing contractor. Stetson-Harza has been taking bids for the rewiring of the house. Also, plans to replace suite doors and door frames are now being made. After the wiring is completed and the doors replaced, the replacement of second- and third-floor carpeting will be considered. Psi U Welcomes New Members

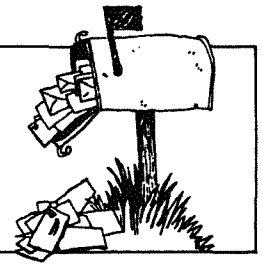
The brothers of Psi Upsilon past and present want to welcome the 20 newest members of our fraternity.

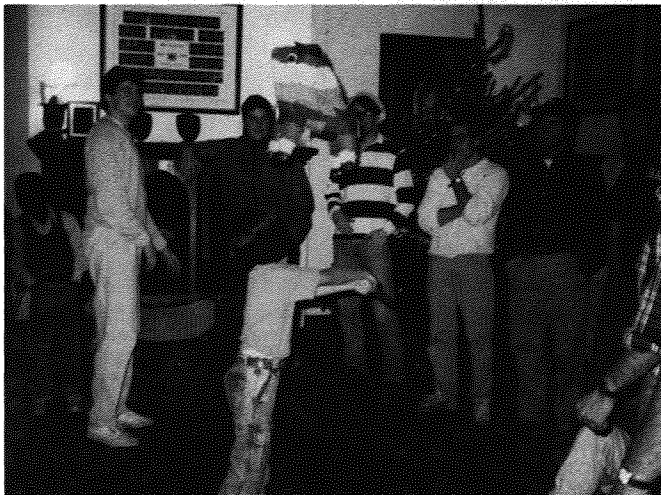
Psi U's Help Unfortunate Kids

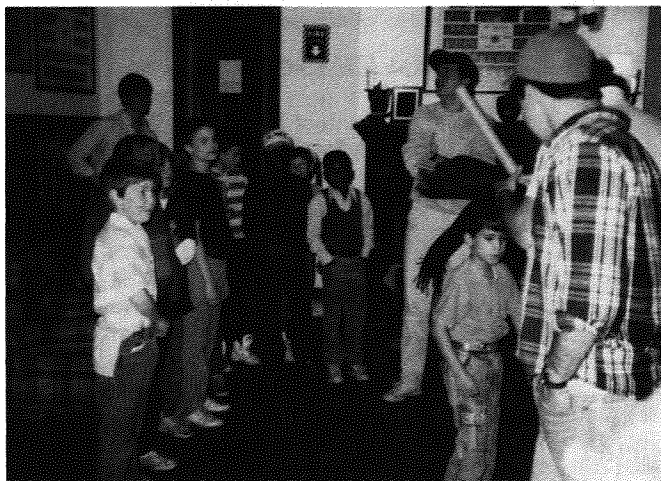

A Message From "Mom"

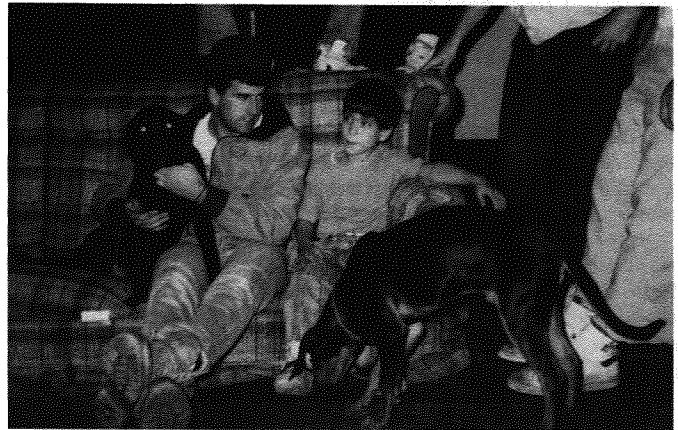
Life at the Psi U house has changed for the better. Our brothers spend their free time with the big brothers program.



Brother Mark Leger '89 with dogs Hershey and Tigger.

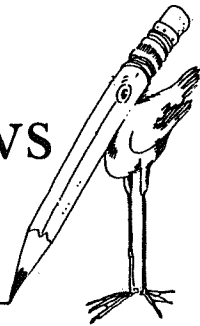
